

November is Black Catholic Month

.Did you know...that of the one billion Roman Catholics in the world today, at least 20% (200 Million) are Black? Africa alone has 130 Million Black Catholics. In fact, the largest Catholic Church building in the world is found in Africa, the cathedral in Yamassouka, the capital city of the West African country known as Cote d'Ivoire. During the selection of the latest pope, many scoffed at the idea that one of the 12 Black cardinals would be picked. However, it would not have been the first. There have been three; all of them have been declared saints. It's interesting to note there are hundreds of revered icons/ statues, of Christ and his mother throughout Europe which picture them as Black figures. The last pope, John Paul II, had a Black icon in his personal chapel that he prayed before every day. Black people have been and are a very vibrant part of the church.

Did you know....Few Catholics and others have heard of the Knights of Peter Claver. This organization was founded in 1909 at Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church in Mobile, Alabama. The organization was founded to give "colored men" a Catholic fraternal organization. (Yes, sadly, there was a time that those other Knights allowed no "colored men" among them. Fortunately those days are gone.) Like the Knights of Columbus, the Knights of Peter Claver are engaged in charitable works. From their start in Alabama a century ago, they now have over 1000 subordinate units around the country.

BE PREPARED

Be prepared. It's that simple. As this Advent season opens before us, the Lord Jesus summons us to stand ready for his coming. At this time of year much of our attention is focused on being prepared for the details that accompany the holiday season. We purchase gifts; we decorate our homes, inside and out; we prepare foods that we eat only during the holidays; we write and send Christmas cards; we attend holiday concerts; we prepare either to welcome family and friends into Is 29:17-24; Ps 27:1, 4, 13-14; Mt our homes or arrange for visits to their homes.

We really can't escape the details that make up the season. Perhaps this Advent is a time to attend to all those details with a different spin. As we prepare to celebrate the feast of Christmas, why not be deliberate about acknowledging the presence of the Lord as we go about these tasks? The Lord often comes to us in wonderfully surprising ways. Let us be prepared.

"Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come."

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace we might do well to contemplate that moment when we actually meet Jesus face to face. Imagine that you are told that Jesus will come to meet you. You are taken to a vast open field and told that Jesus will approach from a certain direction. You train your eyes on the horizon and wait. Then, in the far distance, you see a figure moving toward you. As the figure gets closer you begin to make out some features, such as height, gait, clothing, and more. As the person steadily walks closer to you can make out hair color and facial features. Suddenly, you realize that you know this person. It is someone you encountered who was in need of your assistance. There are two possibilities. You did help this person or you did not. Knowing it is Jesus who approaches, what do you hope you did? So we must always be prepared, for at an hour we do not expect, the Son of Man will come to us.

We just celebrated the end of a liturgical year with Christ the King of the Universe. Now during Advent we prepare for Christmas, and also for the second coming. This means that we will have readings predicting the coming of the Infant Jesus, as well as readings from Revelation which point to the second coming. We also hear Gospel readings, like the one for today, where Jesus tells us about his second coming.

I know that a lot of us are uncomfortable with the Book of Revelations and what seems to be a violent and scary story, but I ask us to look to the end. We know how the end turns out, Jesus wins and the eternal peace begins. Jesus turns up-side-down the ways we define kingship and end times. This past week on Christ the King Sunday, we see Jesus as the king who gives his life. We then see how Jesus is coming at an unknown time and will fix everything and not just come to let out wrath.

Let us try to take hope in what is to come, despite some of the discomfort that will come along the way. It does get the darkest before light comes. We have to die in order to have resurrection

Today marks the beginning of the Advent season and a new liturgical year. Advent has been observed since around the fourth century AD. Initially Advent was seen as a time of preparation, both for new believers to be baptized and for all believers to look forward to Jesus' return in glory. As time went on, the emphasis grew on Jesus' first coming as a baby. Today it seems that Advent is much more about celebrating Jesus' first coming rather than anticipating His second Coming. Still, the Church reminds us to use this time to prepare for Christmas and to let it "renew our ardent desire for (Jesus) second coming. " (Catechism of Catholic Church. This is a season of hope.
