Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowls

This year, CRS Rice Bowl provides a path for Catholics in the United States to build, what Pope Francis calls "a culture of encounter". By following the <u>daily Lenten calendar</u>, sharing the weekly<u>stories of hope</u>, and making the <u>meatless meals</u>, participants will follow a personal journey that leads to us seeing ourselves in the faces of our neighbors, cultivating a spirit of global solidarity and encountering God's love anew.

Pope Francis told Catholic leaders that the "ability to see yourselves in the faces of others, this daily proximity to their share of troubles and their little acts of heroism: this is what enables you to practice the commandment of love, not on the basis of ideas or concepts, but rather on the basis of genuine interpersonal encounter." "We do not love concepts or ideas," the Pope said. "We love people."

"CRS Rice Bowl is about people and the hope we have for each other. It's about our ability to encounter our neighbors no matter where they live, to love them as God loves us.

It is global in its reach, bringing tangible goods and services to people in need around the world. Twenty-five percent of all contributions stay in local dioceses to support hunger and poverty prevention programs such as community gardens, food pantries, soup kitchens, support groups, and job centers. The remaining 75% goes to support CRS' humanitarian and development programs overseas, providing life-saving assistance and hope to impoverished and vulnerable communities.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Blessed Sacrament was not reserved in church buildings in the first centuries of the church. In those early years, of course, people met in borrowed "house churches," gathering on the Lord's Day for community, apostolic teaching, the breaking of the bread, and the prayers, as Acts of the Apostles tells us. Dispersed, people went their way into the workaday world until the next assembly. Weighing down their hearts was the absence of brothers and sisters, not only the sick, but those imprisoned for the faith. No wonder they developed a way of extending the food of the Holy Table to them.

Forty years ago, every altar boy in training heard about Saint Tarcisius. He was a twelve-year-old boy at the time of intense persecution in fourth-century Rome. His community had begun to convey the consecrated bread from their Eucharist to those condemned to death or awaiting trial. Normally deacons did this, but on one occasion, it was necessary to send the boy to bear the holy mysteries to the prison. The legend says that he was an athlete, and was detained on the way by some playmates who wanted him to join in their game. When he refused, they demanded to know what he was carrying. The situation went from bad to worse, and he was badly beaten and died of his injuries. A hundred years later, a pope called him a second St. Stephen. In the nineteenth century, Cardinal Nicholas Wiseman of England wrote a novel in which he expanded the story and popularized it. By then, no one seemed to notice that this twelve-year-old was actually touching and ministering the Eucharist, unthinkable until recently. The first reason for setting some Eucharistic bread aside was not adoration, but Communion of the sick.

THE JOURNEY OF TRANSFIGURATION

"We used to be such good friends. How is it that you've moved so far away?" one man asked another. "Perhaps," the other replied, "you have moved away. By standing still." Today we hear the great account of the Transfiguration. Interestingly enough, the poor apostles just did not get it. We see this as they talk about setting up tents, instead of what is happening in front of them. Instead of admiring and learning from what is happening in front of them, they are uncomfortable and distract themselves with wanting to build tents. Sometimes I think we like to do this as well. Instead of enjoying what God sets before us, we don't want to deal with it and distract ourselves with other things.

One of the things that I think we don't appreciate enough is the beauty in nature that God gives us every day. Some of us would much rather stay inside, play video games, watch TV, and busy ourselves. I myself was raised on a farm and I have always admired nature and natural things. I am finding more and more, that even children who are raised on farms or near naturally beautifully places don't get out as much. I also find, that these same generations not only don't appreciate the outdoors, but they don't appreciate relationships either. If we can't appreciate what God gave us and who God gave us, how are we to appreciate God? I ask us to reflect on these ideas as we continue on this journey of Lent. May we not be distracted while beautiful things of God are happening right in front of us.

I think we miss a lot of miracles in the world as we become more and more distracted. God performs miracles every day, we just have to be open to them. They can be as small as a beautiful sunset, sunrise, or an answered prayer. If we pay attention, we can see the hand of God present in our every day lives. May we stay alert and focus on what God puts right in front of us.

40 Forty is a number that has significance during Lent.. It is a time to imitate Jesus

who in the 40 days spent in the desert taught us how to overcome temptations with the Word of God. The number 40 is mentioned 146 times in the Bible. The number points to or symbolizes trial and testing, a time for God to effect change. God sent rain upon the land for 40 days. After the Exodus, the Israelites were in the desert for 40 years. Elijah walked 40 days in the desert to Mount Horeb. God gives Ninevah 40 days to repent or be destroyed. Jesus fasted 40 days in the desert before he began his public ministry. Jesus presented himself as alive for 40 days after his resurrection.


