

Nearly ten years before, a son and father had parted ways when the business they shared went bankrupt. The son blamed the father. They did not speak to each other again.

Today we dedicate our bell tower. It is always good to rededicate objects used for prayer if they have been changed or renovated. Having our bell able to ring again is a huge deal. As I said in my homily last Sunday, our bell is a sign to our surrounding community that we are here, watching and praying for our community.

I remember from the Disney version of Robin Hood, the scene where Friar Tuck is ringing the church bell, but nobody is coming, because Prince John has thrown everyone into prison, since they cannot pay the newly increased taxes. Friar Tuck said that at the very least, the bell could bring comfort to the people. This is so true, even for our own bell.

In the early church, before bells, someone would use boards to clang together in rhythm to call people to prayers. This method is still used in some Byzantine churches of the east. We have always had a way to get people's attention in the Church. We like to make noise.

May we celebrate this day as a way to thank God for all of the good things he has given us. In some places it is illegal to ring church bells, especially in countries where Islam is the governing force. May we hold fast to our faith and sound and ring out the love and presence of Christ. May we spread that message of love and through our bell, that ministry of presence .

### **Diocesan Response Fund**

Recently all registered members of the parish received a letter from Bishop Medley asking for financial support of the Disciples Response

Fund. This is one of the ways that parishes assist in the work of their diocese. Last year because we exceeded our goal, we received a rebate of \$718.75 in April and we will get another smaller check this fall. (50% of what we contributed over our goal). We still have \$400 of unfulfilled pledges. If you have forgotten, try to pay these off as we receive 50% of that back from the diocese. These funds were used for AC repairs. Our goal for 2017-2018 is \$1025.24.

Blessed Sacrament has benefitted from this fund in past years.. This fall we submitted a request for funds to help with the restoration of our bell tower.

Mark your calendar for Scripture Sunday 2017 in the Diocese of Owensboro! In Pope Francis' apostolic letter, *Misericordia et misera*, he explained that the Year of Mercy reminds us that mercy isn't only for a specially-designated year, but is part of the ongoing life of the Church. He said it would be a good idea if "every Christian community, on one Sunday of the liturgical year, could renew its efforts to make the Sacred Scriptures better known." Following up on Pope Francis' suggestion, Bishop William F. Medley has designated the third Sunday of October as Scripture Sunday in the Diocese of Owensboro. This year it falls on Sunday, October 15.

A lady went to the priest and said "I won't be attending Church anymore." He said, "May I ask why?" She said "I see people on their cell phones during service; some are gossiping; some just aren't living right. They are all just hypocrites." The priest got silent and he said "Okay, but can I ask you to do something for me before you make your final decision?" She said "What's that?" He said "Take a glass of water and walk around the Church two times and don't let any water fall out of the glass." She said "Yes, I can do that." She came back and said "It's done." He asked her three guestions. "1. Did you see anybody on their phone? 2. Did you see anybody gossiping? 3. Was anybody living wrong?" She said "I didn't see anything because I was too focused on this glass so the water wouldn't spill." He said: "When you come to Church, you should be just that focused on God so you don't fall."

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We've seen how the rescue of Eucharistic Prayer II from the mists of history changed the style of our prayer, introducing a sleek simplicity to the prayer said aloud by the priest. Remember, before the reform of our prayer in the late 1960s, the priest whispered the words of the Roman Canon, Eucharistic Prayer I. His voice was not amplified, his back was to the people, who could only tell what was going on by a shift in his posture as he bowed and genuflected and as bells were rung to indicate his progress through the prayer.

With the emergence of the new prayers, some feared that the old prayer would be lost forever if it weren't somehow changed. The reformers asked that it be streamlined a bit by omitting the repeated "Through Christ" at the end of various intercessions, and trimming the list of somewhat obscure saints. The new edition therefore brackets parts of the two lists of saints in the prayer, unfortunately dropping all the women from the second set. The decision was also made to keep the Lord's words at the consecration exactly the same in every Eucharistic Prayer, although there is precedent for more variety. On November 2, 1968, Pope Paul VI signed off on the plan of the new Mass, and by April 1969, the publication of the revised order of Mass was announced.
