He is risen, indeed He is risen! Today we celebrate the most powerful and most important day of the history of the world, the rising of Christ from the dead. This is the day that death is changed forever and no longer has the hold on us that it once did. Fear of darkness, sinfulness and gloom are wiped away with this day. All hope is not lost.

I ask us to pause and reflect on a time in our lives when we felt hopeless. We have all had those moments. Some of those moments may have been the death of a loved one, loss of a job, hurt feelings or a difficult diagnosis. Those things may hurt in the moment, but all of these things can never keep us from what Jesus does for us. We experience hardships in this world, but as burden-some as they may be, our eternal reward that we hope for, when we get there, will overshadow and wipe away any and all hopelessness that we ever had in this world. We just have to try our best to keep focused on Jesus. Sometimes, or even most of the time it is hard to keep focused on Christ. He never loses focus on us though.

There have been a couple of times in my life when I felt totally hopeless and beaten. Jesus got me through those situations. I had been discriminated against and my dignity lowered, but I prayed even harder. I think rejection is one of the most horrible things to experience and when one is rejected by those who are supposed to be compassionate, it hurts even more. That is why we have to rely on Jesus. Nobody can love as perfectly as Jesus does. Even when we feel those hurts, keep on loving. Love overcomes hopelessness. As I said last week, be the change we want to see. If we are discriminate against, then we need to include and love more. It is not easy, but we can make it and things will be okay.

Let the love of the risen Christ fill your hearts this Easter. As we go with our children to hunt eggs and as we spend time with family, may we remember the newness of life that all these celebrations lead us to. This is truly a time to celebrate and thank God for his opening of the gates of heaven to us. Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love and mercy endures forever.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Paschal Mystery is the key to our Christian faith: the dying and rising of Jesus that is the pattern of our life. In their first steps on the road of faith, the catechumens feel the cross of glory traced over their eyes, on their lips, across their shoulders, on their ears, over their heart, and on their feet. The mystery is that even death gives way to life for those who are held in the embrace of Jesus. Today, many new Christians arise from the waters of the font. Yet the font is not the destination of their journey. The goal is Pentecost, fifty days from now, and a lifetime of praise to the Father, in Christ, in the embrace of the Holy Spirit, for the sake of the world. "Neophyte," our ancient word for newly-baptized people, means "newlyplanted" in Greek. If someone in your parish has just been baptized, welcome them today. The smiles on their faces and the light in the eyes is a foretaste of heaven.
