

# Father Jamie's Reflection



Today I will reflect on where demons come from. We have to talk about the bad as well as the good. Previously I explained about the nine choirs of angels. There are also nine choirs of demons, who at one time were a part of the original nine choirs of angels, but these Angels fell and have the same ranking, but do evil instead of good. Then there is possession, where a demon attacks a person from the inside and takes over a persons body, which is extremely rare. Yes, the Catholic Church and uses the ritual of exorcism, which ONLY A priest, with permission from his bishop can do. Again, we have nothing to fear from Satan or his demons as long as we trust in the power of the name of Jesus Christ. In most situations where there is demonic activity, just demanding the evil spirit to leave in the name of Jesus Christ is all that is needed. Also, the most effective way to protect against any demonic attack or temptation, is to go to Mass every Sunday and go to confession on a regular basis. The main thing that Satan wants to do is to keep us away from the sacraments, so we should hold even closer to the sacraments. If any of you experience or know someone who is experience demonic activity, feel free to call me. I am not afraid of the stuff I only get angry when I hear of Satan attacking a person. Thank you! Two words that, when said sincerely, say so much to the person who hears them and much more about the person who speaks them. They acknowledge the existence of someone other than ourselves and they communicate to that person we are aware of an act or words that benefit us; an act or words restrained that might have caused us harm or pain; an act or words of instruction, caution or reprimand that have made us a better person. Thank you! Two words that make others feel accepted and appreciated. Yet, they are two words that often go unspoken because we assume people know we mean or intend them. At the Last Supper Jesus left for us a Memorial of His love. He blessed bread and wine and said Thank you! to the Father. He gave the disciples, and us, His Body and Blood as a New Covenant. He taught us to say Thank you! to God for all He has given to us and to all who love us as He did. Do we say Thank you!enough? Try it, you'll like it! I thank you for reading and reflecting on these words.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The origins of today's solemnity lie in thirteenth-century Belgium. In those days, people seldom received Holy Communion, and never from the chalice. A nun in a troubled convent, Juliana of Liège, devoted her life to stirring up love for the Eucharist, lobbying for a feast day to honor the Blessed Sacrament with Masses and processions.

Juliana may have been inspired by the Ascension Day processions in nearby Bruges. Crusaders brought a treasure home to Bruges from Constantinople in 1204: a reliquary said to contain a cloth from Joseph of Arimathea with which he had helped prepare the body of Jesus for burial. The stain on the cloth was said to be the holy blood itself, and so the people of Bruges built a great basilica to house the relic. Bruges became a great center of pilgrimage because of this treasure, and the procession of the Holy Blood is still one of the greatest festivals in Belgium today. The bishop carries the relic through the narrow streets, and the people wear medieval costumes and act out scenes from the Bible.
