Through his suffering, my servant shall justify many. Isaiah 53:11


TODAY'S READINGS

From the desk of Father Sinoj

Dear friends in Christ.

Greetings! I hope all of you are observing the month of Holy Rosary in your best way possible. Let us continue to entrust our life of Faith and all our intentions to the intercession of our Mother and reflect on the Word of God more often than before. You are all in my prayers.

The Gospel this weekend presents ambitious James and John wanting to gain the prime place among the Apostles. Inevitably the action of James and John aroused deep resentment among the other ten. It seemed to them that they had tried to steal a match and to take an unfair advantage. Immediately the old controversy about who was to be greatest began to rage again. This was a serious situation. The fellowship of the apostolic band might well have been wrecked, had Jesus not taken immediate action. He called them to him, and made quite clear the different standards of greatness in His Kingdom and in the kingdoms of the world. In the kingdoms of the world the standard of greatness is power.

In the Kingdom of Jesus the standard is that of service. Greatness consisted, not in reducing other men to one's service, but in reducing oneself to their service. The test is not, "What service can I extract?", but, "What service can I give?" The basic trouble in the human situation is that men wish to do as little as possible and to get as much as possible. It is only when they are filled with the desire to put into life more than they take out, that life for themselves and for others will be happy and prosperous. God bless us...

THE GREATEST TEST


The greatest test of courage on earth is to beat defeat without losing heart.

TOO MUCH INFORMATION!

There is a common expression: "Too much information!" We usually use it when people tell us details about their lives that we don't want or need to know. Today, when James and John ask Jesus a simple question, making their request for places of honor in the kingdom, a simple answer might have been in order. Instead, as he often does, Jesus answers a question with a question; today it's about drinking the cup of suffering. Then, once the others are indignant over James and John's outrageous request, he proceeds to give them what may have been "too much information" for followers who were simply interested in the pursuit of glory. But this information, though it can sometimes seem "too much" for us, is essential for our lives as disciples. In Isaiah, in Hebrews, and in Mark today, we learn this information. It is in suffering, in weakness, in self-giving service to others, that we come to understand the kingdom. It is the information we need to find our place and come to be honored in the reign of God.

Discipleship: Cultivating an attitude of gratitude ~ Donna Tarantino, Director

"Attitude of Gratitude" is a catchy phrase; but how does it apply to us, as disciples? Consider the distinguishing qualities of disciples. Disciples (or stewards) desire to follow Jesus and recognize the gifts with which they are blessed—talents and skills, treasure, the very gift of life. They offer generously a portion of their God-given gifts, striving to answer "yes" each day to God's call. They accept that sharing their gifts enriches their lives despite the inevitable challenges we all face.

But what is the meaning of "stewardship"? Stewardship can be misinterpreted as a once-a-year task, a burden, or an obligation. Rather, it is a way of life, the process of responding gratefully to God's call to carefully tend the resources entrusted to our care. Stewardship benefits our parish and its members as well as the larger community. What may not be known about stewardship are the benefits to the *giver*...the deepening of faith and the joy that comes from serving and sharing. Without the support and dedication of our parishioners, our parish cannot continue grow and thrive. Where you find active stewards—or disciples—you find those who try to live each day with faith, hope, and perseverance; those who serve with joy and are grateful for their blessings; and those with an Attitude of Gratitude.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As election campaigns move into high gear, sometimes the phrase "the Catholic vote" is heard. It's an interesting concept, since Catholics started out in this country as a very fragile group: fewer than forty thousand of us at the time of the first census in 1790, and only about 2 percent of the population by 1830. It was a priestless church for all intents and purposes, layled clusters of Catholics waiting patiently for the occasional visit of a priest, sustained by gathering when they could on Sunday for devotional prayer like litanies and the rosary. They tried to hold on to their ancestral faith as best they could. Archbishop Jean-Louis Cheverus told one family in Maine to "every day say your prayers on your knees with affection, and every Sunday gather to hear the Gospel, to pray in common, and to quiz the children on the catechism."

Inevitably, some became Protestant, but many more stayed Catholic from generation to generation, with very little encouragement or sacramental ministry from the clergy. Archbishop John Carroll, the first American bishop, tried to make Church law flexible: shortening the length of the fast before Communion, easing the Lenten fast, and even relaxing the rule of Sabbath rest at harvest time. Catholicism in England had been quietly sustained in this way for two centuries, and the first American Catholics carried on as had their ancestors, providing a fertile soil for the unprecedented success and phenomenal growth of the Church in our country.
