Let us observe this Lent as an opportunity to grow in our faith and holiness.

In His message this weekend Jesus draws our attention to practical points of Christian living and challenges us to use our words as He used them in His preaching and healing ministry – to heal, to restore, and to bring back life, joy and hope. Lent begins Wednesday. We have a 6 PM Mass; if you cannot attend that one, please check other local parishes for their Mass time. Ashes will be distributed.

We are called to **Prayer**, **Fast**, **Almsgiving**.

The Church asks us to **fast** two days in Lent—Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. That means one main meal, two smaller meals and nothing in between the meals. Everyone between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

Abstinence is denying ourselves meat. This is our obligation on Ash Wednesday and every Friday during Lent. This is asked of everyone the ages of 14 and up.

A Simple Plan could be 1-1-1 Plan

Concentrate on one sin or fault that is getting in your relationship to God. Try to get rid of it.

Add one positive action (Bible reading, visit the lonely, say kind things instead of gossip..)

Deny yourself something that you really like or are attached to. (Critical tongue, impulse purchases, time in front of TV or internet, fast food and donate money to poor)

THE DIFFERENCE

The difference between perseverance and obstinacy is that one often comes from a strong will, and the other from a strong won't.

THE INSIDE SHOWS

In this third Sunday of our reading from the Sermon on the Plain, Jesus speaks of the inner soul and its outer expression. He uses images as he teaches. He addresses all of us.

Jesus sees a plumb line connecting the soul with the soul's expression-words and actions. He uses exaggeration to drive home his point. We are urged to clear out the debris that blinds us. He knows that we have an uncanny ability to be blind to our own weaknesses, though they be as big as a board. He knows, too, how willingly we seem to ferret out others' smallest specklike flaws.

And this, too, is for our general consumption; solid old goodness and solid old badness will show eventually. The old Latin saying, which echoes Jesus' images, is true: "What is bred in the bone will out in the flesh." By and by, the inside will show through.

*March 6 is Ash Wednesday 6 PM Mass Today's Gospel, like many Scripture passages, uses a reference to agriculture to make a point. "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit." Lent begins this week. During this season of spiritual preparation, we can reflect on what kind of "trees" we are. Christ seeks to bear fruit in each one of us; what kind of fruit do we produce?

The weeks of Lent offer the opportunity for us, as disciples, to devote ourselves to the three pillars of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Ask the Lord for help to focus outwardly rather than on ourselves—to change—so that we can bear much fruit.

Lenten Opportunities

<u>Rice Bowls</u>: Eat a simpler meal one time a week or don't eat out and donate the money to help the poor. 25% of donations go to hunger and poverty alleviation in our community. Will be collected on Holy Thursday.

<u>Scripture Reflection</u>: Each Sunday at 9:20 you have the opportunity to gather in the hall to reflect on the Sunday's readings.

Outreach Opportunities:

Weeks 1 and 2: Donate items for the people who live at the homeless shelters.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Many Catholics who are not active in the Church will still seek out ashes this Wednesday. Likewise, many Jews who are not otherwise observant will follow the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, with great exactness, fasting and refraining from work and entertainment. People customarily dress in white as a symbol of purity and a reminder of God's promise that our sins will be made white as snow. While the overture to Ash Wednesday for Christians may be a festive Mardi Gras celebration, for Jews it is the New Year feast of Rosh Hashanah. Ten days before the Day of Atonement to God, people are expected to repair breaks in human life. These are days for offering forgiveness and seeking to repair harmed relationships with family, friends, or coworkers. Everyone is expected to seek out someone and "clear the air" by asking for understanding for any mean words or thoughtless deeds in the past year.

Perhaps the ashes you receive will be invested with deeper meaning if you follow a similar plan. This year, Rosh Hashanah will be September 29, and Yom Kippur October 8. A conversation with some Jewish friends or neighbors about their experience of a season of repentance may be a blessing on your Lent.
