

Psalm — In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge (Psalm 90).


Second Reading — Paul asks Philemon to accept back his slave Onesimus as a brother (Philemon 9-10, 12-17).

Dear Friends in Christ,

September 8th is the feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. As we wish a Happy Birthday to our Heavenly Mom let us pray for her intercession to be guided by the Spirit of God to fulfill His Will through our lives. Wish you all God's abundant blessings through the intercession of Our Lady. But being Sunday liturgically we celebrate the Day of the Lord.

The liturgy this weekend helps us to reflect on the true Christian discipleship which is a total commitment to the Will of God, putting God first in our lives. Being a follower of Christ requires one to "renounce" both earthly possessions and possessions of the heart. In the Gospel Jesus lays out four conditions for true Christian discipleship. 1) Renounce too much attachment to family, giving priority to God and His commandments. 2) Break off the excessive attachment to possessions by leading a detached life, willingly sharing one's blessings with others. 3) Accept the hard consequences of discipleship which include dally sacrificial service done for others.4) Calculate the cost involved in following Jesus.

Jesus does not want a large number of "half-way" disciples who are willing to do a "little bit" of prayer, "little bit" of commitment, a "little bit" of dedication, a "little bit" of love. Jesus wants disciples who are truly committed to prayer, to discipleship and to being ruled by him as their king. Often we are tempted to forego the call to faithful stewardship, faithful worship attendance, faithful sexuality, honest business practices, accurate tax returns and compassion for the less fortunate. May the Cross of Christ, whose Feast we celebrate on this Saturday 14th of September , be our strength to be true Christians!





CONTINUE TO CHANGE

When you're through changing, you're through.



Today's Gospel certainly demands our attention. Jesus uses rather harsh wording to illustrate the depth of commitment required to be His followers. We all know how hard it can be to make a commitment; for instance, we might need to make lifestyle changes to improve our health or adjust our spending habits. At times it may feel easier to guit than to persevere.

We are called to become mature disciples, regardless of the cost. But we are not perfect! We will encounter many obstacles along our faith journey. When we feel like we have strayed or become lukewarm in our faith, we can strive to make changes and get back on the path of discipleship. Do you believe you are an intentional disciple? That is, are you intentional about your faith? In daily prayer, we can ask for the guidance and strength we need to persevere.

The pastor of a little country church had one man who faithfully occupied the second from the front pew every Sunday. He also like clockwork, fell asleep five minutes into the sermon, not to awaken until the hymn began. One Sunday the pastor decided it was time to teach the man a lesson. Fifteen minutes into the sermon, he interrupted it and whispered, "If you want to go to heaven, stand up!" Everyone but the man stood. He sat them and then shouted, "If you want to go to hell, stand up" and he ended the request pounding the pulpit loudly. The pounding did the job and the old deacon jumped to his feet. He looked around at everyone and said, "Preacher, I don't know what the vote is on, but it looks like you and me are the only ones for it."

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians share a love for the Byzantine liturgy because it is during the Eucharist that the Church is most true to its identity, expresses its integrity, and discovers its vocation. Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians celebrate essentially the identical liturgy, with only very slight variations. It is a fairly complex ritual weaving together three separate layers of prayers: a liturgy prayed in the sanctuary by priests, often hidden by a curtain or screen; a liturgy sung by the assembly and led by a deacon in front of a screen formed of painted icons; and a third layer of private prayer by the priest, who prays in support of the deacon and the faithful. It is an eyes-wide-open experience, gorgeous in visuals, and filled with the sound of God's people singing prayer. The energy of the worship centers on the presence of Christ, largely through an awareness of heaven touching earth when the Church gathers to celebrate.

In the late twentieth century, Latin Rite Catholics were encouraged to embrace a style of worship that was "full, conscious, and active," a value that has never been lost in the East. The liturgy has great impact in its beauty, in its poetry and contemplation, and by the actions of bowing, signing with the cross, and chanting that are required of the assembly. Contact with the Eastern Church reveals some key values that have been obscured in our own Church and are slowly being recovered.

When we journey without the Cross, when we build without the Cross, when we profess Christ without the Cross, we are not disciples of the Lord; we are worldly; we may be bishops, priests, cardinals, popes, or anyone else, but we are not disciples of the Lord. --Pope Francis
