

Dear Friends in Christ,

Congratulations to all of you for all your efforts to make the Thanksgiving meal a great event. It was truly an expression of our gratefulness to God and his marvelous wonders. I hope this celebration has brought us closer to God and His Will by our communion and concern for others. This Sunday we enter the last week of the liturgical year with the solemnity of Christ, the King of the Universe reminding ourselves to recognize Him and surrender all our being for His gracious Will.

The Gospel speaks of events when Jesus was lifted up on the Cross, his "throne." The inscription on the cross read "This is the King of the Jews." Pilate probably had his own reasons to write this inscription on the board. But he was unknowingly accepting the person and mission of Jesus as King and Savior. The repentant thief accepts Jesus as his Savior when he called out His name "Jesus" (the one who saves). The Solemnity of Christ the King reminds us of the great truth that Christ must be in charge of our lives, that we must give him sovereign power over our bodies, our thoughts, our heart and our will. In every moral decision we face, there is a choice between Christ the King and Barabbas. One who seeks to live in Christ's Kingdom is the one who says "Thy kingdom come." Let us renew our surrender and obedience to Christ the King and pray for His grace to be faithful to Him.

OF KINGS AND KINGSHIP

Americans have an uncomfortable relationship with kings. The American Revolution was fought for independence from King George, after all. Nonetheless, today every Catholic church around the world celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Today's feast invites us to look beyond our national loyalties and rejoice in our primary identity. We are children of God in Jesus, Christ the King. Our readings help us consider what it's like to belong to God's kingdom. The book of Samuel captures the deep longing of the Israelites for a king to shepherd them. Saint Paul reminds the Colossians that we belong to the kingdom of Christ, whose power he praises in a beautiful hymn. Finally, Luke's Gospel calls to mind the kind of king Jesus chooses to be—a suffering servant, a man for others. By sacrificing his life for us, Jesus throws open the gates of Paradise.

Gratitude is in season year round!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today's solemnity, the final feast of the Church year, is a youngster as feasts go. In 1925, Pope Pius XI was distressed by global political upheaval and the de-Christianizing of society. That year was a "Holy Year," keyed to the sixteen hundredth anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, when the words "and of his kingdom there will be no end" were added to the Creed. The Pope explained that although most feasts had developed over many centuries, the Church sometimes provided a new feast to address new needs. He pointed to the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, showing Christ's love and compassion in a time when many people embraced a cold and gloomy spirituality. Originally on the last Sunday of October, in the late 1960s the solemnity of Christ the King was moved to the last Sunday of the year.

Fresh from baptism's waters, we are anointed with chrism "as Christ was anointed priest, prophet, and king." This feast is a key to our identity. On this feast, we recognize Christ as a king who breaks the usual mold of kingship, and who shapes his kingdom with our hands, our words, our deeds of love and service.
