Laugh of the Week A mother was teaching her three-year old daughter the Lord's Prayer. For several evenings at bed time, she repeated it after her mother. One night she said she was ready to try it on her own. Mother glowed with pride and listened to each word right up to the end. "And lead us not into temptation," she said "and deliver us from all emails."

OUR DEEPEST NEEDS

The word of God serves up a tremendous feast for us today. Isaiah beckons all who hunger and thirst to come to the Lord for satisfaction. The psalmist cries out, "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs" (Psalm 145:16). Saint Paul tells us that nothing can separate us from the love of God. Finally, in the Gospel, we hear the story of the miraculous feeding of over five thousand people from a mere five loaves and two fish. Most of us have our material needs met on a day-today basis. These scriptures, nevertheless, have much to say to the contemporary believer. We must ask ourselves, "Where are my deepest hungers? Where are my thirsts?" After material needs are satisfied and, in some cases, over-satisfied, many people still experience a deep longing for spiritual balance and well-being. As the loaves and fish are multiplied in today's Gospel, perhaps our prayer can be a longing for the satisfaction of the deepest needs that only God can fill.

PRAYER AND HUMILITY


From the desk of Father Sinoj



Greetings! Thank you all for your generosity and belongingness you show towards our parish. In this strangely different time when we had to cancel the picnic, the fundraising aspect of the picnic was a concern. You have responded with much thoughtfulness and care. May this communion of ours bring us more and more joy and peace in our lives!

The Gospel message this weekend is drawn from the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish by Jesus. This narrative teaches us the conviction that through Jesus we share in God's own abundance and in the promises made to God's covenant people. This can be regarded as a miracle of Divine Providence and as a Messianic sign. This incident also anticipates the Eucharist. The words and actions of Jesus, and the communal sharing of this event are symbols explaining the meaning of Eucharist. In this time let us take a lesson from this Gospel, that no matter how impossible our life may seem, with Divine help it can be lived because "nothing is impossible with God."

Aug. 4th is the Feast of St. John Marie Vianney, the patron of Priests. Let us remember all the Priests and Deacons who serve us. In a special way let us pray for our Pastor Fr. Jerry Riney. As Aug. 6th is the Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord, forty days before the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, we remember the glory of Christ in our sufferings.

Discipleship

In today's Gospel the familiar story of the miracle of the loaves and fishes tells us how, out of love and compassion, the Lord identifies the needs of the crowd, then cures the sick and feeds the hungry. I've always been a little struck by the challenge of Jesus' words to his disciples, "give them some food yourselves." Perhaps this is a message to each of us to share our gifts to serve others, even though we often don't believe we have much to give "five loaves and two fish are all we have here." What should our motivation be for giving and sharing? Do we give only because our church asks us to do so? Do we serve because we feel guilty or pressed into participating? As disciples, we are called to give back a generous portion of our God-given gifts (and we all receive gifts) because we are thankful for those blessings. When we share our time, skills, and treasure, the Lord accepts those gifts (regardless of the size) and multiplies them. And we may never know how our prayer, acts of kindness, service, or generosity will result in little everyday miracles.



SAINT JOHN MARY VIANNEY (1786-1859) August 4

A busy pastor jokingly suggests the secret of John Vianney's holiness: "He died seventeen years before telephones!" Call they didn't, but visit they did, keeping Vianney eighteen hours a day in the confessional. Stories abound of reading hearts and exorcisms, but Vianney's first miracle was getting ordained. Difficulty with studies delayed him, prompting the rector's apology to the bishop, "So far to ordain just one, especially this one!" The bishop, who could not know he was ordaining the future patron saint of parish priests, replied, "No burden to ordain one good priest!" In Ars, only an elderly handful attended Mass, "praying," one told Vianney, "for a priest with brains." But he stayed forty-two years, fulfilling the promise he made the day he arrived. In a sculpture just outside the village Vianney points skyward: "Show me the way to Ars," he tells a boy, "and I'll show you the way to heaven." To someone who feared there was no heaven beyond the grave, Vianney smiled, "My child, it would have been heaven enough to have lived as Jesus' disciple on earth."
