

THE CROSS OF JESUS

The perception of a cross changed dramatically after Jesus' crucifixion. Before that event, death on a cross was not only horrible, it was degrading. It was a penalty reserved only for the most wretched of criminals. The word "glory" would not have found its way into the same sentence containing the word "cross." But all that changed with Jesus. Over time, believers began to venerate and honor the cross. They painted, sculpted, and carved images of it. Many lost their own lives for their association with it. Today our reverence for and relationship with the cross recalls little of the contempt originally associated with it. As it has been through the ages, it is our perception of the cross that determines how we follow Jesus.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! I hope these words find you in peace and confidence in Christ! Let us continue to seek God's Will and design in all things that are happening around us that are not in our control. We shall continue to be mindful of all the people who are suffering around the world.

Today's Gospel passage reminds us that Christian discipleship demands self-control, the willingness to suffer, the readiness to follow Jesus by obeying his commandment of love, and generosity in surrendering our lives to God. Jesus apparently surprises His disciples when He foretells His suffering, death and resurrection. Peter, as always, takes the lead in protesting and is being rebuked by Jesus with strong words. That creates an opportunity for Jesus to announce the three conditions of Christian discipleship: "deny yourself, take up your cross and follow me."

Self-denial calls for evicting selfish thoughts, desires and tendencies from our hearts and lives and letting God fill our hearts with Himself. Carrying the cross with Jesus always entails pain and suffering that can bring reparation for sins and sanctification of souls. Following Jesus means that, as disciples of Christ, we shall live our lives according to the Word of God by obeying Jesus' commandment of Love.

"You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Jesus' message in today's Gospel is about discerning whether our thinking is Godcentered or self-centered. Living as disciples of Christ is not always easy; it is human nature to want things our way rather than deny ourselves and be willing to take up crosses! Instead of living for our own desires, we can pray to know and follow God's will. Can we identify the gifts God has given us? We can pray and listen for how is God calling us to share those gifts. When we carry a cross to serve others, we're sure to meet Jesus along the way.

Discipleship Reflections: Do I believe that I am God-centered, or am I selfcentered? Each morning, we can ask the Lord, "what is your will for me today?"

The Vision of Stewardship

I love the original movie *Willy Wonka and the* Chocolate Factory. All the way through while I watch the film I still laugh and feel like a child. It is only the last line with which I have an issue. Wonka by now has chosen Charlie to succeed him as head of the chocolate factory. They board an elevator that proceeds to crash through the roof and begins to fly. Wonka then asks Charlie if he ever heard of what happened to the boy who got everything he ever wanted. After Charlie says no, Wonka explains, "He lived happily ever after." As I get older, I can say I have met several people who got all or most of all they have ever wanted, but unlike Charlie, it did not lead to endless bliss. In fact, as a Christian I know that that statement of Wonka's is a lie. The secret to living happily ever after lies in not getting all you ever wanted, but instead in giving all you ever wanted away.

A person can't have any sense of that reality until they begin to see his or her life transformed by Jesus. When we have accepted the challenge placed before us and made a choice to live a certain way daily, we can find ourselves transformed. Following Jesus is not easy, but it is the only true way to find authentic joy. When we have emptied ourselves and allowed him to fill the open spaces in us, we become different. We are transformed and, if enough of us in a parish community experience the same journey, our parish is transformed as well. Then we begin to transform the world around us. Don't be fooled: A flying elevator is cool, but it pales in comparison to what can happen when we find a new life in Jesus Christ.

SAINT GREGORY THE GREAT (540-604) September 3

Imagine, fourteen hundred years after death, boasting a best-selling CD! Yet outside the Church and within, Gregorian chant is enjoying a renaissance. Still, the timeless sacred music that bears his name is but part of Gregory's legacy. Renouncing civic service for monastic life, Gregory's administrative and diplomatic skills prompted continual summons from the cloister. Papal ambassador and advisor, he was eventually elected pope himself, renowned as a wise steward of the church's material possessions, generous benefactor of the poor, sponsor of missionaries, and promotor of monasticism. His liturgical enrichment of the Church endures not only in Gregorian chant, but in eloquent homilies still gracing the Liturgy of the Hours, the "Gregorian Canon" (Eucharistic Prayer I), and his spiritual classic, *Pastoral Care*, once presented to new bishops at ordination. Of countless impressive papal titles—Supreme Pontiff, Vicar of Christ, Successor of Saint Peter, Prince of the Apostles—the title still so cherished that it heads official documents is the one Gregory coined to describe his papal ideal: Servant of the Servants of God. Together with being designated "the Great," a fitting epitaph.
