
Let us remember to pray for those who have recently died or those in the process of dying. Remember to pray for the souls in purgatory, especially for those who have no one to pray for them.



GOD'S PROMISE

The lengthy passage from Samuel is a wonderful exposition of God's promise to the house of David: that his throne would forever be gloriously occupied by his descendants. Hidden in the mystery of the prophecy is the promise of the Savior, the Messiah, Son of God and Son of David. The prophet Nathan, speaking in God's name, poetically turns around David's plan to build a house for God, and announces God's plan to build a "house," that is, a dynasty for David. From this house of David will come the Messiah, the Christ, not in kingly splendor as David ruled, but as a humble man, destined to rule forever and over all. When God gives a gift, it's amazing what we are given—so different from what we ever could have imagined.

Finding Inspiration in Mary's "Yes."

There is comfort in the familiar scriptures of Advent; they become woven into our lives and hearts as we hear them throughout the years. Today's Gospel focuses on Mary's response to the angel Gabriel's announcement. We can find inspiration in her faith and trust and in her response, despite her initial doubt and confusion. We, too, are called to put our faith and trust in God, even during times of doubt or fear. Along our journey to becoming mature disciples, we are called to recognize, accept, and share the gifts we are given. With grateful hearts we are called to give back to the Lord a generous portion of the gifts and blessings we receive (and we all receive gifts; we are each uniquely blessed).

Spend some time in quiet prayer during this last week of Advent. Reflect on how Mary must have felt during her visit from the angel Gabriel. Ask for the faith, trust, and courage needed to say "yes" as Mary did when the Lord calls upon us to serve.

Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord.

May it be done to me according to your word."

On the Second Sunday of Advent we noted that "John [The Baptist] was just being John." He discerned God's will for him and he did it. Now we hear about "Mary just being Mary," a young teenager in a tiny hamlet on a craggy hilltop in the northern region of Galilee. Mary heard a message from God so amazing she wondered how it could happen. But she realized it was God's will for her and she consented. There were many details and consequences she could not know, but she said "Yes!" to be the human mother of God incarnate. That was "Mary just being Mary." That is all God asked of her and that is all God ask of us - to be all that God creates us to be. For us, just as for John and Mary, we begin by identifying, accepting and developing all of the unique talents, abilities and gifts God has given to each of us, and then using them to the best of our ability for ourselves and for others. Is that not the greatest gift we can give to Jesus when we celebrate his birth on Christmas? Is our present for Jesus ready?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Children of the parish are somewhat focused on Santa Claus these days, who is keeping an eye on who's naughty and who's nice. Santa Claus, with his heavenly patron Saint Nicholas, has been more or less in charge of gift-giving to American children for a hundred years or so. In other places, perhaps more attentive to our Christian tradition, there are different gift-bearers. In Greece, Saint Basil delivers the presents on his feast day, December 31, and makes sure everyone is sprinkled with holy water. The Baby Jesus is in charge elsewhere, called the Christkind in Austria and Belgium, El Niño Jesús in Columbia, and Le Petit Jesus in France, where he shares his duties with Père Noël. In the Czech Republic almost everyone is atheist, but Ježíšek, the infant Jesus, brings gifts to one and all. In Poland the "Star Man" is said to bring the gifts, although often he turns out to be the village priest in disguise. Saint Nicholas, not his Americanized cousin, is the giver in Holland, where he wears a bishop's miter, and in Russia, where he wears a bishop's crown. Soviet Russia tried to dethrone Saint Nicholas and promote Grandfather Frost, but no one was much fooled by this attempt to squeeze religion out of Christ's birth. One country has a saintly woman in charge of the gifts, Saint Lucy, honored in Sweden on December 13, when children serve their parents breakfast in bed. Some children have a second round of gifts on Epiphany, when the magi assume the gift-giving duties. In general, the gifts of Christmas are simple pleasures, not great heaps of treasures. Once upon a time, a new pair of socks or an orange was enough for us. No matter what gifts we receive, all of them are to point us to the true gift, and the true giver.
