Are you excited, captivated, enthusiastic, and sitting on the edge of your seat eager to celebrate his coming among us at Christmas, and waiting for him to come again? If not, why not?

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

The comment we often hear when someone is acting silly or goofy is "Oh, that is just George [or whatever the person's name] being George." We can wonder what Elizabeth or Zachariah said when people told them that their son John was living in the desert, wearing a camelhair shirt and leather belt [expensive belts were braided or made of fine linenl and eating locust and wild honey. Did they say, "Oh, that's just John being John." If so, they were right. John was being who and what God created him to be - a messenger sent by God to prepare the way of the Lord by making straight his path and calling people to repent for their sins. John had accepted his role and mission in life. He knew he was not the Messiah but that he was to prepare the way for the Messiah. He may have dressed a little strange and eaten an unusual diet, but he did what God created him to do. Are we doing what God created us to do? Are we preparing the way for the Lord, at least the way for the Lord to come into our heart?

Prepare the Way

Advent is a time of waiting, a time of patience and preparing. It's hard to recall a time when patience has been harder to come by! Our patience has been tested by countless challenges in 2020 including shortages of supplies, ever-changing restrictions, job stress or loss, illness or the grieving of loved ones lost, or the sadness of isolation, which has taken many forms.

And yet, some things do not change. The sun rises and sets, seasons change, and during Advent we still await the coming of the Lord. This year, with perhaps more time at home (whether by choice or not), we can prepare our hearts by spending time in daily prayer. Create some silence by turning off your phone, iPad, and television. In that silent space, invite the Lord to be with you. Reflect on and count your blessings, because even in this difficult time there are things for which to be grateful. Offer prayers for all those affected by changes the pandemic has brought about. Pray for those experiencing isolation, whether in nursing homes or alone at home. Pray for all those in many roles who have worked tirelessly to battle COVID. Pray for the patience and strength to weather the storms of this pandemic season. In daily prayer, we can watch and wait for the Lord and prepare the way for Him to enter our hearts.

The Story of Our Lady of Guadalupe and Juan Diego

The feast in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe goes back to the 16th century.

A poor Indian named Cuauhtlatohuac was baptized and given the name Juan Diego. He was a 57-year-old widower, and lived in a small village near Mexico City. On Saturday morning December 9, 1531, he was on his way to a nearby barrio to attend Mass in honor of Our Ladv.

Juan was walking by a hill called Tepeyac when he heard beautiful music like the warbling of birds. A radiant cloud appeared, and within it stood an Indian maiden dressed like an Aztec princess. The lady spoke to him in his own language and sent him to the bishop of Mexico, a Franciscan named Juan de Zumarraga. The bishop was to build a chapel in the place where the lady appeared.

Eventually the bishop told Juan to have the lady give him a sign. About this same time Juan's uncle became seriously ill. This led poor Juan to try to avoid the lady. Nevertheless the lady found Juan, assured him that his uncle would recover, and provided roses for Juan to carry to the bishop in his cape or tilma.

On December 12, when Juan Diego opened his tilma in the bishop's presence, the roses fell to the ground, and the bishop sank to his knees. On the tilma where the roses had been appeared an image of Mary exactly as she had appeared at the hill of Tepeyac.
