


# From the desk of Father Sinoj

Dear friends in Christ,

Greetings of God's blessings as we begin the Holy Week on this Palm Sunday! This is the time of year we stop to remember and relive the events which brought about our redemption and salvation. Attentive participation in the Holy Week liturgy will deepen our relationship with God, increase our Faith, and strengthen our lives as disciples of Jesus.

The liturgy this Sunday combines contrasting moments, one of glory, the other of suffering: the royal welcome of Jesus in Jerusalem, and the trial, crucifixion, death and burial of Christ. The royal reception given to Jesus symbolized the procession in which the sacrificial lamb is taken to the temple during the feast of Passover. The people's slogan of greeting "Hosanna" was a cry for salvation. Passion narrative challenges us to examine our lives in the light of some of the characters in it – like Peter who denied Jesus, Judas who betrayed Jesus, Herod who ridiculed Jesus, Pilate who condemned Jesus etc. Let us observe this Holy Week especially the Holy Triduum with a sincere intention to experience more of God's love and mercy and increase our Faith and love for Him!

#### **PASSION**

The contrast between the processional reading in today's liturgy and the proclamation of the Passion is striking. We are given a glimpse of how profoundly the word of God is fulfilled in Jesus.

First he must be hailed as the Messiah, the One who is to come. He must be acknowledged by all, though they do not know what they are saying. They think he is the promised king, a worldly king of the Jews who will free them from the Roman occupation. They do not yet understand, even the disciples, exactly where this triumphal procession is leading. In our lives, we too do not know where we are going. It is in faith that we can follow Christ wherever he may lead us, trusting that death is not the end, nor evil the victor.

#### **SUFFERING**

Jesus did not come to do away with suffering or remove it. He came to fill it with his presence.

# Thought for the Week

What an ironic twist of events! Jesus is hailed with palm branches as he comes down a street one minute and faces agonizing suffering and death on a cross the next. Does any of this make any sense? They shouted, "hosanna to our King," out of one side of their mouths and, "crucify him," out of the other. At first glance it seems like such hypocrisy. Yet, when we step back there may be more truth to the story than we care to admit. We struggle with Jesus. We hail him in our churches but struggle to figure out what to do with him on our streets. We are fine when we hear pious renderings of his messages and preaching but wince when it gets to the part about changing the way we conduct business and becoming more sensitive to the disadvantaged, poor and marginalized. We invoke God's name when we want victory and keep silence when it comes to global solidarity. We talk out of both sides of our mouths too, looking only to what works or suits us at the time and leaving the rest. There exists in each one of us a person who hails our King with hosannas and a person who is all too willing to choose Jesus over Barabbas for the cross. Something to think about this Holy Week!

## **Palm Sunday**

As we reflect on our experiences over these past weeks, we can ask ourselves: is anything different? Have I made changes or observed the Lenten pillars of praying, fasting, and almsgiving to prepare my heart for Easter? Have I reconciled with the Lord? Is there someone in my life with whom I should reconcile?

**Pray**: Set aside time quiet time during Holy Week to spend time with the Lord in prayer. Come and pray the Stations of the Cross Monday evening at 6; attend our Lenten Holy Hour (Palm Sunday at 5 pm) to pray or receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Fast: Fast from "busy-ness;" put aside usual routines or "to-do's" to participate in and focus on Holy Week liturgies. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday offer us the opportunity to walk with Jesus through his passion, death, and Resurrection. For those who are not yet attending Mass in person, our Holy Week and Easter liturgies will be available via livestream. <u>Give</u>: Prayerfully consider a donation for the CRS Rice Bowl. Give of yourself by giving the gift of forgiveness. Lent is a good opportunity to let go of fears or grudges and make amends with someone in your life with whom you need to reconcile. Is there something for which you need to forgive yourself?

#### .TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

For many centuries, Christian pilgrims have longed to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, and on Passion Sunday the eyes of the world are on the *Via Dolorosa*, the "Road of Sorrows," in Jerusalem. As soon as it became safe for Christians to worship in public in the fourth century, a way was marked out. It was changed a few times over the years, and today's usual route was sketched by the Franciscans six hundred years ago, although Anglicans and Byzantines have their own unique detours. Friday is the most favored day, although it is crowded then. Almost everyone begins at the Lion's Gate in the Muslim Quarter, and ends at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. It's less than a quarter mile, but it threads its way through crowded markets with souvenir shops and fast-food snacks. There are, just as in your parish church, fourteen stations along the way. The exact spots are not known, but what matters is the pilgrim's unique ability to see even an ordinary road in a teeming city as something more than meets the eye.
