
From the desk of Father Sinoj

Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! This Sunday, the third Sunday of Lent, we are given an opportunity to reflect on sanctification of our souls and lives. Lent is the ideal time to clean out the Temples of our own hearts and to offer to God proper Divine worship through our repentance. The Gospel gives us the dramatic account of Jesus cleansing the Temple of its merchants and moneychangers, followed by a prediction of His death and Resurrection.

The Temple in Jerusalem was the place where God made His Name or Glory to dwell, a symbol of God's relationship with His people. Jesus' promise of a new Temple suggested that God's glory would be manifested, not in a building, but in a Person. Jesus replaces and supersedes everything the temple had formerly symbolized. Jesus is the Temple in Whom His followers come into contact with God.

As Christians we also have this vocation to be Temples, the medium of relationship with God. Hence, we have no right to desecrate God's temple by impurity and injustice. We are expected to cleanse our hearts of all evil and welcome Jesus into our hearts and lives by repentance and renewal of our lives. I encourage you to make use of the opportunities for confessions in neighboring parishes.

KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH

There's no better way to deepen our Lenten practice than to review the Ten Commandments. The first three, having to do with our right relationship to God, get the most ink. The one we busy people probably have the most problem with is keeping holy the Sabbath.

If we take this commandment literally, babies will go undiapered and dishes will stay on the table, or perhaps meals will not be served. The sick will go unattended and nothing that has anything to do with physical labor will be done. Is mental labor really work? How about changing that dirty diaper (poor baby!)?

We need to depend on God to discern how to observe real Sabbath time in our lives. The point of this commandment is that God has given us a great gift: one whole day per week when we are free to rest, worship God, sing, feast, love, and rejoice. As Psalm 19 proclaims: "The law of the LORD is perfect, / refreshing the soul" (19:8). Our Sabbath rest is a great gift, to be received from God with joy, not with nitpicking.

Year of St. Joseph

On December 8, 2020, Pope Francis declared that the Church will be celebrating the Year of St. Joseph. The Year of St. Joseph began on December 8, 2020 and will end on December 8, 2021. This is a historic event for the Church because it is the first time celebrating a Year of St. Joseph. Pope Pius IX declared him as "Patron of the Universal Church" (Sacred Congregation of Rites, Quemadmodum Deus, Dec. 8, 1870). Pope Pius XII proposed him as "Patron of Workers" (Address to ACLI on the Solemnity of Saint Joseph the Worker; May 1, 1955). Pope John Paul II called him "Guardian of the Redeemer" (Apostolic Exhortation Redemptoris Custos, August 15, 1989). Saint Joseph is traditionally considered the "Patron of a happy death" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, par. 1014). Pope Francis calls him "the special patron of all those forced to leave their native lands because of war. hatred, persecution and poverty"; he also considers St. Joseph the "protector of the unfortunate, the needy, exiles, the afflicted, the poor and the dying" (Patris Corde, 5). St. Joseph, pray for us!

Gospel Reflection

We have lost our axis to the world of "anything goes" and no longer see the Ten Commandments as practical and wise guideposts to effective living. We live on "relativism island" where only a possible suggestion to "love and do not harm" may be the only standard able to be preached. While Jesus most certainly emphasized love above anything else, it was never about warm fuzzy feelings or halfhearted humanitarian efforts. The love of which Jesus spoke establishes an intimate connection with God, neighbor, self, and creation. Because this love, who is God Himself, is at the foundational core of our lives, it demands actions and attitudes that serve to build up, increase, and free up those relationships. Love requires proper conduct. Preserving and enhancing these love centered relationships is at the heart of the Ten Commandments (and the Beatitudes) and the reason for Jesus' display of anger in the temple.

The Ten Commandments can save the world from turmoil and conflict by instilling basic moral and relational principles within us. They also hold a healthy sense of sin in balance and always remind us of our relationship with God and the freedom God offers. Our faith preserves these jewels of truth that we often look beyond, dismiss altogether, or seek to remove from public view. Human beings can be so arrogant at times. Our Lenten journey, especially when embarked upon with sincerity and resolve, can restore all of our essential relationships. When we get absorbed in life's preoccupations and demands, things can quickly get distorted and we can find ourselves way off track. In short, we find ourselves in sin.

.TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today you hear about Jesus driving the money-changers from the temple. If you wished to get as close as possible to this site today, you would in fact be at a Muslim shrine, the Dome of the Rock, built on the ruins of Herod's temple.

Archeologists believe that this striking, gold-domed crown of a shrine is set precisely where the Holy of Holies once was. Jews believe that the rock is the exact spot where Abraham was prepared to sacrifice Isaac. It is not a mosque, as some think, but a shrine, the oldest one in the Muslim world. For them, the rock is the place from which the Prophet Mohammed ascended on a visit to heaven. The Crusaders mistook the shrine for the actual Temple of Solomon, and the infamous Knights Templar used it as their headquarters and model for their churches elsewhere. The geometric perfection of the shrine is a mathematician's dream. The inscriptions are not exactly hospitable though, since they encourage Christians to "depart from error" and declare that "Jesus son of Mary was only a messenger of God." In ancient times, those who prayed here after walking around the rock were given a certificate entitling the bearer to admission to paradise. The ticket had to be buried with them.
