Psalm — The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want (Psalm 23).


Second Reading — In Christ Jesus you who were once far off have become near by the blood of Christ (Ephesians 2:13-18).


From the desk of Father Sinoj



Dear Friends in Christ

We have a new Pastor Fr. John Thomas. Let us thank and praise God for His providence and guidance through our shepherds. Being grateful to all our pastors in the past, let us open our hearts to our new pastor, encourage him, support him and pray for him. Fr. John Thomas began his ministry to us on Tuesday, July 13. We wish him all the best and fruitfulness in his new assignment. Fr. John is the youngest of six children and was raised at St. Agnes Parish in Uniontown, KY. He entered the seminary in 1984, graduated from Thomas More College in 1988 and began graduate studies at St. Meinrad Seminary. Fr. John was ordained a priest in May 1993. He has served as associate pastor at St. Thomas More (Paducah) and Holy Name of Jesus (Henderson); Director of Liturgy and Enrollment at St. Meinrad; and pastor of Sts. Peter & Paul (Hopkinsville), St Michael (Oak Grove), St. Stephen (Cadiz), Christ the King (Madisonville), Holy Spirit (Bowling Green), St. Michael the Archangel (Guthrie), and now Saint Stephen Cathedral and Blessed Sacrament Chapel. He will be celebrating the Mass at our Church next Sunday.

The Liturgy of the Word on this 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time prompts us to reflect on our God who as a Good Shepherd redeems us and provides for us. Prophet Jeremiah admonishes the irresponsible leaders of Israel and promises the people a Redeemer, a Good Shepherd. REST IN THE LORD

For several weeks we have listened to readings that have recounted just how arduous the work of prophets and disciples can be. In today's Gospel, the Lord Jesus listens to the reports of those he had sent out "two by two" to minister to the people. After the apostles reported what they had done, Jesus, recognizing their fatigue, says, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest awhile" (Mark 6:31). The Lord is My Shepherd

Today's Gospel is short in length yet offers powerful messages. Jesus tells the tired, hungry apostles, "come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest awhile," but the crowd arrives at their place of retreat ahead of them. When Jesus saw the crowd ("his heart was moved with pity for them"), he felt compassion for the needs of the people "like sheep without a shepherd," and gave of himself immediately to teach and guide them.

Rest Awhile: Make time each day to spend with the Lord. Take a break from the demands of daily life and the distractions of phones, electronics, and social media. Through prayer and quiet reflection, nurture your relationship with Jesus. He offers us—the sheep of his flock—nourishment, guidance, mercy, and peace. **Be Compassionate:** Be open to recognizing the needs of others, whether in our own family, our parish, or our greater community. When we share our time, talent, and treasure for the benefit of others, we follow Jesus' example

Coming out of church, Mrs. Peterson asks her husband, "Do you think that Johnson girl is putting a rinse on her hair?" "I didn't even see her," Mr. Peterson admits. "And the dress Martha Hansen was wearing," Mrs. Peterson continues, "really, don't tell me you think that's the proper outfit for the mother of two." "I'm afraid I didn't notice that, either," Mr. Peterson says. "Oh for heaven's sake," Mrs. Peterson snaps, "a lot of good it does for you to go to church.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The American Revolution cleared the way for freedom of religion in the former colonies, since the colonies had always been a more religiously tolerant place than the old country. Even so, colonial laws restricted the practice of the Catholic faith, and just as in England, Americans who desired to be priests or nuns had to go to the Netherlands or France. As political storm clouds gathered in France, an American woman, Mother Bernardina Matthews, the prioress of the Hoogstraeten Carmel in Holland, made a brave move. With two other American nuns, her nieces, and a Dutch sister, she came to Port Tobacco, Maryland, in 1790. Within twenty years the community had grown to twenty, although by 1823 their farm failed and they had to move to Baltimore and open a school. The Carmelite order requires contemplation and cloister, so in time the school was closed. The Port Tobacco land had long since been sold, but in 1976 a community of nuns was able to return thanks to loyal neighbors who had worked for forty years for their restoration. Today, our original American convent is fully alive in prayer, hard work, and strong community.
