
From the desk of Father Sinoj

Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! The Gospel this Sunday is about the bond of love that marriage creates between a man and a woman, a bond that God intends to be permanent. Jesus explicitly teaches about marriage and divorce, the Divine origin of marriage, the sacredness of family life, and the indissolubility of marriage.

Jesus' stand against divorce is very stern. He did not claim to introduce a new teaching, but reminded the Jews of the original intention of God. Quoting the book of Genesis, Jesus proved that God made us male and female and commanded that "the two shall become one flesh, then concluded, "they are no longer two, but one body" — partners with equal rights. Marriage demands that each should become the right person for the other. It means building a union based on love with mutual generosity and mutual good will.

Christian marriage involves both a sacred and legal contract between man and woman at the same time is rooted in a special Covenant with the Lord. That is why Jesus states that a valid marriage is permanent. Therefore the Catholic Church has always firmly taught that a Sacramental marriage between Christians in which there has been true matrimonial consent and consummation, is absolutely indissoluble, except by the death of one of the spouses.

Diocesan Covid Guidelines

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

One of our great treasures is the way the Church has frequently flourished under unfavorable conditions, like the grape ivy on the mantel that refuses to die no matter how infrequently you water it or open the drapes. Like the apartheid laws in South Africa in the last century, the penal laws of Ireland were aimed at depriving the majority population of basic human rights. The Protestant parliament of Ireland enacted laws limiting the practice of Catholicism. The goal was to force conversion from "popery" to the Church of Ireland, and additional laws took aim at Jews, non-Anglicans, and Quakers.

There were laws against intermarriage, laws against Catholics being lawyers (there was a one-hundred-pound fine), a law granting lifelong income to priests who became Protestant, and a ban on weapons. In fact, until 1793, a Catholic man had to recruit and pay a Protestant man to serve in the local militia in his place! As if family life is not complicated enough in any age, the sons of a deceased father could divide his land equally, unless one became Protestant. In that case all would go to him! When allowed, new Catholic churches had to be built of wood, not stone, be off a main road or city square, have no steeple or bell, and be called a "chapel." Catholic "Emancipation" was largely secured by 1829, but even up to the founding of the Irish State in the 1920s, some effects of the laws endured. No wonder that poor Irish immigrants to the United States frequently built gloriously beautiful churches as their first act on free soil!

Therein lies the...rib

"If I were God..." is a dangerous way to start a sentence, but how many of us do this? Probably more regularly than we would like to admit. Even if we don't verbalize the sentiment, we likely think it from time to time. Most of us finish that statement with some genius, original idea for eradicating difficulty and pain from the world. If I were God, I wouldn't let anyone go hungry. If I were God, all wealth would be equally distributed. If I were God, war wouldn't exist.

I imagine that, when we think thoughts like these, God shakes His head and wonders why we don't look a little harder at the whole of His creation — because I can promise you, it's never lacking. When Adam had a need for a companion, God used what was available: Adam's rib. Everything that He had put into place was already perfect, already complete. Woman was a new creation, but not a new species. Adam searched through all of creation to find the perfect mate, but God had tucked the answer inside of His creation all along.

I'm guilty of it as much as anyone else — looking to Heaven with a chip on my shoulder. "Why haven't you sent me what I need? I've been asking over and over again." But have I even thought to look inside of myself?

Where is the rib you are missing today? What are the opportunities God has set before you? What are the needs that He is ready to fulfill, if only you would stop wasting time lamenting all the solutions that don't fit the bill?

- <u>Serving</u>. Sharing our talents and skills glorifies God, the Giver of all gifts, and is vital to the many ministries in our parish. We are all blessed (albeit differently) with talents which we are called to share for the benefit of our parish and community. What talents has God given me? How am I sharing them with my parish and greater community?


