Dear Friends in Christ,

I wish all of you Peace and Blessings of the Solemnity of Christ the King. Today we conclude our liturgical year with this Feast, proclaiming in a striking and effective manner Christ's royalty over everything in/of the Universe and reminding ourselves of the fidelity and loyalty we owe to Christ. The earthly kingdoms have boundaries and they are limited by space and time. But Christ's kingship is far superior; it is beyond space and time. His incarnation and sacrificial death on the cross has made us both adopted children of God and future citizens and heirs of the Kingdom of Heaven.

In the gospel today Jesus clarifies to Pilate about His Kingship that He is the King and His Kingdom "does not belong to this world." He rules as King by serving others rather than by dominating them; His authority is rooted in Truth, not in physical force, and His Kingdom, the reign of God, is based on the Beatitudes. Let us constantly work on to prove our citizenship in the Kingdom of God by our allegiance and surrender to Christ the King. I would like to appreciate all of you who are doing your part to make our Thanksgiving dinner a success. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although our Puritan forebears at Plymouth Rock were almost a hundred years removed from their Catholic roots, the old liturgical calendar still had an unconscious claim on their hearts. We've already seen how on Saint Martin's Day, November 11, medieval continental Europe observed a great harvest day of Thanksgiving, with games, dances, parades, and a festive dinner of roast goose. With the goose went ample draughts of "Saint Martin's Wine," the first wine of the new harvest. Martinmas celebrated full barns and larders stocked for the winter. Even after the Reformation, the tradition of eating goose on Saint Martin's Day was retained in Holland, and it was there that our Pilgrims encountered this tradition. When Governor Bradford sent four hunters out into the Massachusetts wilderness in the autumn of 1621, they did indeed find some geese and ducks, and were persuaded by the indigenous people to try turkey, too.

Just as the liturgical calendar has been tweaked over the years, President Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving to the third Thursday in November in 1939, probably to extend the Christmas shopping season. The protest was so great that in 1941 the day established by President Lincoln, the last Thursday in November, was restored. If the Pilgrims had known of the Martinmas connection, they might never have celebrated at all!

The Judgment Day: President John F. Kennedy was very fond of a particular story, which he often used to close his speeches during his 1960 presidential campaign. It is the story of Colonel Davenport, Speaker of the Connecticut House of Representatives back in the year 1789. One day, while the House was in session, the sky of Hartford suddenly grew dark and gloomy. Some of the Evangelical House representatives looked out the windows and thought this was a sign that the end of the world had come. Uproar ensued, with the representatives calling for immediate adjournment. But Davenport rose and said, "Gentlemen, the Day of Judgment is either approaching or it is not. If it is not, there is no cause for adjournment. If it is, I choose to be found doing my duty. Therefore, I wish that candles be brought." Candles were brought and the session continued.



Liturgical Update

As humans, all of our senses are part of who we are as a complete person. Our Catholic faith uses this belief as we worship. Incense, art work, statues, music all help us lift our minds to God.

Bells call us to worship. For centuries, the practice was to ring a bell at certain times of Mass, especially when the Holy Spirit is called down and at the words of consecration.

When the Mass was celebrated in Latin. fewer and fewer people understood the language and the priest had his back to the people. A bell was rung to assist the people. After Vatican II when Mass was again celebrated in the language of the people and many of the complex rituals of the Mass were simplified, the ringing of the bells became optional.

The current rubrics of the Mass allow for a small bell to be rung as a signal and at each elevation. Some people believe that the ringing of the bell is important because of a decline of faith in the holy Eucharist as truly being the Body and Blood of Christ. By ringing the bell, we receive a subtle reminder to "pay attention.. Jesus is here."

Beginning with the new liturgical year, (Nov. 28) the bells will be rung during the Eucharistic prayer. We will also begin inpew collection at Offertory time.
