

From the desk of Father Sinoj




Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! I believe you all have made a great beginning of the Season of Advent. Let us make all the efforts to "prepare" for the coming of Christ into our hearts. Today, the second Sunday of Advent challenges us to make a royal highway in our hearts so that we may receive Jesus as our saving God on Christmas.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITON

Look around most Catholic Churches and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for Jesus, for Mary, and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation.. Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing. (JS Paluch)

Liturgical Update

As humans, all of our senses are part of who we are as a complete person. Our Catholic faith uses this belief as we worship. Incense, art work, statues, music all help us lift our minds to God.

Bells call us to worship. For centuries, the practice was to ring a bell at certain times of Mass, especially when the Holy Spirit is called down and at the words of consecration.

When the Mass was celebrated in Latin, fewer and fewer people understood the language and the priest had his back to the people. A bell was rung to assist the people. After Vatican II when Mass was again celebrated in the language of the people and many of the complex rituals of the Mass were simplified, the ringing of the bells became optional.

The current rubrics of the Mass allow for a small bell to be rung as a signal and at each elevation. Some people believe that the ringing of the bell is important because of a decline of faith in the holy Eucharist as truly being the Body and Blood of Christ. By ringing the bell, we receive a subtle reminder to "pay attention.. Jesus is here."

Beginning with the new liturgical year, (Nov. 28) the bells will be rung during the Eucharistic prayer. We will also begin inpew collection at Offertory time.

Why do we celebrate the Feast of the Immaculate Conception?

Since the beginning of the Church, the Blessed Virgin Mary has been regarded as the holiest and the most blessed of all disciples. The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception places Our Lady before the faithful as an example of what God can do and what we can do, if like Mary, we put ourselves in God's hands and at God's service, always open to what God asks and always seeking to fulfill God's will. It encourages us to do our best to remain free from sin. In the course of our life. because of human weakness, we fail and commit sin. The Immaculate Conception reminds us that if we cooperate with God's grace, as did Mary, we can lead a life as free from sin as is humanly possible.

Awaiting the Salvation of God

The world does not seem big enough to contain the jubilation of the first reading. In the Gospel reading the Roman empire isn't big enough, either. The great powers of Rome are named and made to stand waiting for the arrival of god's salvation. And we find Paul meditating joyfully on what really matters.

According to Baruch, the city of Jerusalem is like a person standing on tiptoe looking for God's salvation, which is coming from the east. Those who were led away on foot, heads down, now come back, a proud people. Why, the very way is smoothed out. The path is lined with fragrant, lush trees.
