

# From the desk of Father Sinoj



Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! On this fourth Sunday in the Ordinary Time, the Gospel speaks of the reaction of Jesus' townspeople and his response. They were amazed that one of their fellow-villagers could speak with such grace and eloquence and with such authority. But their amazement turned into doubt and displeasure and even anger, when He testified to the prophecy as being fulfilled in Him.

Jesus responded to the people's skepticism by referring to the Biblical stories of how God blessed two gentiles - through the prophet Elijah, the widow of Zarephath and through prophet Elisha, Naaman the Syrian - while rejecting the many Jews in similar situations;. This conveys that God showers his mercy, love and compassion upon those who are open to His grace and ready to surrender completely to His providence. Jesus also invites us to have the courage of our Christian convictions in our Faith, even when we face hatred and rejection because of them.

February 2<sup>nd</sup> is the Feast of Presentation of the Lord, which is also observed as World Day of Consecrated Life. Please pray for inspiration in the minds of people and perseverance in the lives of the consecrated to continue Christ's Light shine in our world. On February 3<sup>rd</sup>, on the memorial day of St. Blaise we have a tradition of blessing throats. We shall have a blessing of throats after the Mass next Sunday.

## **Treasures From Our Tradition**

The song of the angels, "Holy, Holy," resounds from our lips at every Mass. There was a widespread belief in the first religions of the world that God stirred creation into being by a word, a song, a musical note. Music and a sense of God's presence have always been inseparable. In the liturgy, your voice is invited into this song as the priest names the reasons for our praise. "Heaven and earth are full of your glory." and we are not passive onlookers, but participants in this glory. Catholic prayer no longer assigns this angelic hymn to a choir, but gives it to you to sing. Even if your voice is thought to be suitable only for a well-insulated shower stall, you are called into this song.

We are born to sing--just listen to a baby testing the full range of newly-discovered vocal abilities. Soon we get shushed and hushed into quiet, and given lots of messages that our voices are unwanted, and that we need to raise our hands in order to be heard. All of that is overturned in liturgy, the place where God waits to hear us come alive in the song of all creation. In heaven, everyone's in the choir. Why not start practicing now?

# Answer:

We commemorate the faithful departed on November 2<sup>nd</sup> each year. However, we can and should continue to pray for the dead. Our growth in Christian perfection takes a long time. At the time of our death, many of us might not be saints yet. But God, in His mercy, allows for those who love Him to experience purification after death. Our word for that state is Purgatory. February 8 is the feast day of Saint Josephine Margaret Bakhita. Saint Josephine was born in 1869 in Sudan, died in 1947, was beatified in 1992 and canonized in 2000. St. Josephine was kidnapped as a child and sold into slavery. After being bought and sold numerous times, once freed, she became a Canossian nun. She is the patron saint of Sudan.

A diocesan Mass will be held on her feast day, Tuesday, February 8 at 6:00 PM at St. Stephen Cathedral, which is also the world day of prayer, reflection and action against human trafficking. All are welcome to attend to this Mass or view it via St. Stephen's livestream on Facebook or YouTube. This Mass is being sponsored by the Bakhita Empowerment Initiative, which is a Catholic Charities of Louisville program to combat human trafficking.

# But the Greatest of These is Love.

Today's Second Reading from 1 Corinthians is beautiful and encouraging, but it is also a reality check. We hear that we can do it all—move mountains, comprehend all mysteries and knowledge, give away everything we own, but (you knew there was a BUT coming, right?) if we have or do these things without love, we have nothing. That's powerful. Reflecting on this Scripture passage helps us consider *how* we love. We are reminded that love never fails; we need look no further than a crucifix to help us understand what love really is. "So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (1 Cor. 13:13)

What does love have to do with discipleship? As disciples, we are not asked to do it all, but we *are* called to share our God-given gifts and talents justly and with love. It's not about the amount of treasure or service we give, but about the love with which we gratefully receive our gifts and share them. There are many quotes about love attributed to Saint Teresa of Calcutta. One of my favorites is "Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love."

# **An Ongoing Mission**

In this hometown synagogue, Jesus' neighbors are amazed by his words. Nevertheless, they remind each other, "Is this not Joseph's son?"

Surely the people know who he is. The carpenter's son. The young man who had learned in this very synagogue. The boy down the street.

Conflict arises as Jesus begins to define himself in a new way. When he compares himself to the ancient prophets Elijah and Elisha, the tensions grow. The tensions multiply when Jesus begins to tell of a new mission for God's people: the good news of the scriptures is intended for all.

In his famous passage from the First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul reminds us of the eternal nature of love. Love does not come to an end. In today's readings, we are reminded that, like love, Jesus' mission cannot be contained. Jesus slips through the crowd of persecutors and moves on to new challenges. We are called to this same perseverance n the name of love.

# St. Blaise | February 3

You may be familiar with the annual "blessing of throats" that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life. History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:

Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
