




Dear Friends in Christ

Greetings! Today, on the 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Gospel continues to present the sermon of on the plain by St. Luke. Today's passage draws our attention to our careless, malicious and rash judgments about the behavior, feelings, motives, or actions of others. Jesus condemns this attitude as it damages the good reputation of others and causes them irreparable damage.

Jesus calls us to identify the faults within ourselves before we blame others. That is a requirement in order to make a clear and integral correction of mistakes. Without correcting our perspectives and perceptions, we blame the reality outside. Hence we are called to allow the Spirit of God cleanse us from within so that we may draw goodness from inner springs of holiness.

This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. We begin the Season of Lent, in observance of penance and preparation for the Great Solemnity of Easter. This Season gives us an opportunity to reflect more on the mystery of our Salvation for which Jesus Christ our Savior suffered and died on the Cross. Let us pray for God's grace to make this Season more Spiritual and Sincere.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Many Catholics who are not active in the Church will still seek our ashes this Wednesday. Likewise, may Jews who are not otherwise observant will follow the Day of Atonement. Yom Kippur, with great exactness, fasting and refraining from work and entertainment. People customarily dress in white as a symbol of purity and a reminder of God's promise that our sins will be made white as snow. While the overture to Ash Wednesday for Christians may be a festive Mardi Gras celebration, for Jews it is the New Year feast of Rosh Hashanah. Ten days before the Day of Atonement to god, people are expected to repair breaks in human life. These are the days for offering forgiveness and seeking to repair harmed relationships with family, friends, or coworkers. Everyone is expected to seek out someone and "clear the air" by asking for understanding for any mean words or thoughtless deed in the past year.

Perhaps the ashes you receive will be invested with deeper meaning if you follow similar plan. This year, Rosh Hashanah will be September 29 and Yom Kippur October 8. A conversation with some Jewish friends or neighbors abut their experience of a season of repentance may be a blessing on your Lent.



What Kind of Fruit Do You Produce?

Today's Gospel, like many Scripture passages, uses agricultural references to teach and challenge us. "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit." Christ seeks to bear good fruit in each one of us.

Lent begins this week! This season of spiritual preparation offers opportunities for us, as disciples, to devote ourselves to the pillars of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. In prayer, we can ask the Lord to help us focus outwardly (i.e., be "other centered," rather than "self-centered") and to make any changes needed in order to bear good fruit. A question for reflection: What kind of fruit do I produce? "For every tree is known by its own fruit." (Luke 6:44)

Planted in the House of the Lord

Grocery delivery apps are all the rage these days, and I can't deny the convenience of tapping your finger a few times and seeing your week's shopping dropped on the doorstep. But there is one aspect of this trend that seems to make a lot of shoppers nervous — fruits and vegetables.

A lot of us have strong opinions on our fresh produce and aren't ready to delegate this highly subjective selection process to a total stranger. My father was a produce manager and I remember as a child learning about the complexities of choosing correctly. Getting a bad bag of under ripe tomatoes after shopping on an app could easily sour one on the whole idea.

Forrest Gump said life is like a box of chocolates. I say, we're all like grab-bags of produce dumped on someone's doorstep — but if we're Christians who live our faith publicly, we're stamped with the name of God. If your thumb is green enough, you know that you can tell a lot about a gardener from the produce he grows. We who are planted in the house of the Lord — what do we reveal about our Gardener?

What do our actions show of His teachings? What do our words reflect of His voice? What does our strength reveal of the soil from which we sprang and the lifegiving waters that nourished us?

When we open ourselves up to those we encounter, let's make a special effort to show the care we have had — lest our peers come away from the experience thinking God doesn't know how to garden, when in reality, it's us who don't always know how to grow.

St. Katharine Drexel | March 3

With a family like hers, it's no wonder that St. Katharine Drexel (November 26, 1858 – March 3, 1955) grew up to become one of the first American-born saints.

Both financially and spiritually wellendowed, the Drexels were devout Catholics and set an excellent example of true Christian servitude with prayer and care for the poor.

After her father's death, St. Katharine Drexel gave up her inheritance and instead devoted her life to the material and spiritual well-being of black and native Americans. Mother Drexel, as she would become known as, established the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored, and together they opened a boarding school in Santa Fe. . She died at the age of 96 and was canonized in 2000 by Pope John Paul II.

The Inside Show

In this third Sunday of our reading from the Sermon on the Plain, Jesus speaks of the inner soul and its outer expression. He uses images as he teaches. He addresses all of us.

Jesus sees a plumb line connecting the soul with the soul's expression-words and actions. He uses exaggeration to drive home his point. We are urged to clear out the debris that blinds us. He knows that we have an uncanny ability to be blind to our own weaknesses, though they be as big as a board. He knows too how willingly we seem to ferret out others' smallest speck-like flaws.

And this too is for our general consumption: solid old goodness and solid old baldness will show eventually. The old Latin saying, which echoes Jesus' images, is true "What is bred in the bone will out in the flesh.." By and by, the inside will show through.
