




Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! Today, the fourth Sunday of Lent is called *Laetare Sunday* – Rejoice Sunday – anticipating Easter joy by being reconciled with God through repentance and the confession of our sins. The thoughts and efforts of repentance and reconciliation shall lead us to the joy that we have renewed our communion with God and His Church.

Today's Gospel celebrates the joy of the prodigal son and his father on his "homecoming." The Son rejoices as he experiences his father's forgiving and overflowing love. The father rejoices over the return of his prodigal son, celebrating the reconciliation of the son with his father, his family, his community, and his God.

Our Lenten observances are aimed at reconciliation and renewal of our relationship with our God and His people. The reflections on the sufferings of Jesus shall lead us to the sorrow of our sins and repentance. And this repentance shall not be sober; rather it shall lead us to the joy of being united with God and His Church. Let us not forget the unifying and communion aspect of Lent as we are past halfway through the Season.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION.

Today, "Laetare Sunday," breaks the somberness of Lent for a little rejoicing, and the readings all summon us to an awareness of reconciliation. One of the best-loved stories of our tradition is today's Gospel story of the runaway son and the prodigal father. Prodigal, of course, is an adjective meaning "spendthrift or extravagant to a degree bordering on recklessness" and although the boy maxes out the credit cards, it is really the father who is prodigal with forgiveness.

Part of the excitement of this Laetare Sunday is rooted in the ancient catechumenate. Long ago, midway through Lent, the "elect" were focusing more and more on the gift of reconciliation accomplished for them by Christ and about to be realized in the Easter sacraments they were preparing to celebrate. In some places, the elect were even bedecked with roses on this day. A person bedecked with roses sticks out in a crowd; a person formed by the Eucharist and committed to living a life of reconciliation does too. That's you!



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The Face on God's Brochure

When a church is raising funds for a new building or a diocese is launching a stewardship appeal, there is usually someone — or several someone's — who serves as the face of the campaign. Maybe it's a married couple, or a family, or a group of folks who have been particularly active in the community and can speak to the worthiness of whatever endeavor is being undertaken.

Oftentimes, for better or worse, we fill that role for God. We are the face on the front of His promotional brochure. If we call ourselves Christians, that means that people will meet Christ through us. That's what being an Everyday Steward is — a steward, everyday; someone who conducts his Master's business when the Master is not seen.

It can be intimidating because we have so much baggage and no capabilities of our own. But then we remember that we are offered reconciliation through Christ — that "the old things have passed away, (and) new things have come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). We remember that we are the prodigal sons, and the fattened calf has been slaughtered on our behalf.

So let us think to ourselves each day, "Whoever I encounter will meet Christ's ambassador. I was dead and have come to life again. How can I speak to the worthiness of that reconciliation? How can I make others desire it?"

BE GRACIOUS

There are several themes that can be explored in today's Gospel, one of which is the gracious response of the father. "Gracious" can be defined as a response characterized by kindness, courtesy, compassion, generosity of spirit, or even mercy. While the father surely had reasons to feel hurt and angry, he instead welcomed his son with a gracious response of forgiveness and boundless love.

What a powerful example. If we strive to develop this demeanor, we—as disciples—can respond graciously to life's many challenging situations (or sometimes people!) instead of displaying annoyance, resentment, or judgment. It may take practice, but responding graciously can serve as a wonderful example to those around us. It's worth noting that there will likely be situations in which we also need to *receive* a gracious response as well. Lent is a great opportunity to begin practicing graciousness!
