#### My Dear Parishioners:

It is hard to believe, but summer vacation will soon be ending. Our first day of will be upon us soon (WOW!). Our parish community is blessed to have a Catholic School System school as part of our life. However, with this blessing comes great responsibility. Our goal is simply to encourage our teachers, strengthen our curriculum, and take the resources before us and put them to the best use possible. As the new school year will soon be upon us, I simply ask that you make part of your daily prayer our school principals, teachers, staff, and especially our students. I strongly support Catholic education and ask you to do the same. Top Ten Benefits of a Catholic School Education

1. An Incarnational View of the World: *Catholic school students learn that God is present and active in their lives and in the world. They learn to recognize the "footprints of God" in their daily experiences, especially in the midst of life's challenges. They see the signs of God's love around them, and become instruments of God's grace in their own neighborhoods, communities, and the world.* 

2. Immersion in the Paschal Mystery: *Our lives are a series of small and not so small dyings and risings. In union with the Paschal Mystery, we realize that there is redemptive power in suffering, and in the power of the Cross. In it lies the answer to the mystery of all of life's successes and failures. In the experience of the Paschal Mystery, we also realize the need for community.* 

3. The Value of Relationships as a Reflection of the Divine: *Catholic school students learn to experience God's grace and presence in their lives through their relationships with family, friends, and teachers. The loving and supportive relationships they experience are reflections of the love and life-giving dynamic of the Trinity.* 

4. A Nuanced View of Scripture: Catholic school students are given the opportunity to explore the beauty and richness of Sacred Scripture seen through the lens of faith and lived out in daily practice. They also come to view the Human Person as created in God's "image and likeness," and destined for eternal life. They learn to apply Scripture to their own lives as a tool for prayer and the true guide for virtuous living

5. Civic Engagement: Catholic schools were ranked #1 in the percentage of graduates who actively participate in civic and community activities such as voting, volunteering, letter writing to legislators, and donations to charity, not just for a tax write-off, but out of a sense of the requirements of justice.

6. Service for the Common Good: Catholic schools promote service as an essential component of their curriculum. Catholic school students learn that they are in fact "their brother's keeper," and have a responsibility to respond to the needs of those around them.

7. Discipline as a Faith Expectation: Catholic schools promote self-discipline through clarity of moral vision based on the Gospel. Students are challenged to be Christ-like in word and action. They are asked to examine their choices and actions in the light of the Ten Commandments and Gospel of Love.

8. Centrality of arts, Ritual, Drama, Music to the Life of Faith: Through Catholic education students are exposed to the richness of the religious Tradition, Music, Art, Literature, Drama, and Ritual.

9. The Fullness of Catholic Identity at the Heart of the Church: Catholic education has always been at the heart of the Catholic Mission. The students are the "greatest work of the Church" and go out and share the gifts they have received as doctors, lawyers, policemen, business people, teachers...

10. Personal Excellence as a Spiritual Goal: Catholic School students learn that excellence is a response to God's blessings. Students learn to make a difference in the world around them.

#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The pilgrim experience of going by foot to Santiago de Compostella, the shrine of St. James, reached its high point this week at the feast of the Apostle, with tens of thousands of pilgrims on the road. Typically, they cover twelve to twenty miles a day through rough territory. The difficult journey and the often primitive lodging facilities are made bearable by the joy of the pilgrims, their songs and prayers. When their journey is documented properly, they receive the scallop shell, a reminder not only of James the fisherman, but also his call to fish for human beings and to baptize the nations. In the Middle Ages, those who wore this badge on their hats were granted lodging and hospitality wherever they wen. Next to the palm, the sign of a .Jerusalem pilgrim, the scallop shell was most highly prized.

In the Middle ages, some people so enjoyed the pilgrim road, although, although it was filled with discomfort and danger, that they spent most of their lives on the road. Today some people take up the route for exercise, but are drawn gradually into the spirituality of the journey. As you make your summer travels, always fold in a element of pilgrimage: a long walk through beautiful countryside, a visit to a church, a prayer of gratitude for your journey through life's hills and valleys. 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#### St. James the Apostle | July 25

Saint James the Apostle is also called James, son of Zebedee, or James the Greater to distinguish him from the other James in Jesus' group of twelve. He and his brother John were collected by Jesus along the sea of Galilee. Matthew 4:18-22 tells the story of Jesus calling first Simon Peter and his brother Andrew and then the sons of Zebedee. In Mark 3:17 the brothers receive a nickname from Jesus who calls them "sons of thunder" because of their many extreme reactions, like that in Luke 9 when they offer to call down fire on a Samaritan village.

Saint James was part of Jesus' intimate circle, a witness to the Transfiguration, the resurrection of Jarius' daughter, and the agony in the garden of Gethsemane. In A.D. 44 Herod Agrippa had "James, the brother of John, killed by the sword." (Acts 12:2) He is the only apostle whose martyrdom is written of in the New Testament.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

Meister Eckhart asks, "Who is the man whose prayers God always hears?" He answers, "God hears the man who appeals to God as God. When, however, man appeals to God, hoping for some worldly good, he is not appealing to God at all, but to what he is asking of God. He is trying to make God his servant. On this point, St. Augustine says: 'You pray to what you love, for true whole prayer is nothing but love!' Thus, we pray to what we love, and no one rightly prays to God but he who prays for God and has nothing on his mind but God." We struggle with what we want God to do and how we want our prayer validated. Meister Eckhart is correct. We often want God to be our servant. We further struggle with trusting that God knows what we need and that His will is best.

God's will is not some predetermined outcome of events that we must simply suggest. "Thy will be done" is not an invocation beckoning us to accept a particular state of affairs passively. Rather, it is the humble and confident placement of ourselves in the presence of the God we seek, whom we call "Father." We must remember that God is the God of life and light. It is from nothing that God brings something and from the darkness that God brings life. Prayer allows us to seek the One we love with the assurance that all will be well regardless of what course the events of our lives take. God is not about passive submission but the humble trust of love.

That's what makes the Lord's Prayer the perfect prayer. It provides us with proper disposition and focus, putting in line all of the essential relationships of our lives. It celebrates and fosters the ever -deepening relationship of trust we have with our Creator. It also calls us to keep open the doors of love between our brothers and sisters with the power that comes with forgiveness. If in one's darkest hour they can find the resolve to fervently pray this perfect prayer of Jesus' conviction, then there is no doubt that God will hear their plea, and bring them ever closer to His heart. What more does one need to weather the storms of life besides faith, hope, and love? These are God's most perfect gifts and all we really need.
